This summer Adrienne was a research and development intern at EyeVerify, a biometrics company that developed a phone app that allows you to log into applications on your phone using your "Eyeprint" rather than entering a password. Her work focused on coming up with novel ways to detect and defeat illegitimate log-in attempts. She continues to work with EyeVerify part-time during the school year.

Adrienne is a volunteer with Science Pioneers. This local organization runs the city-wide Science Fair and Adrienne was a judge at the fair last year. She also volunteers with Expand Your Horizons, a program for 6th - 8th grade girls. Female mentors present hands-on workshops for the girls. Her first workshop presentation will be this January. Adrienne says she is excited to share with the girls some of the cool ways images can be manipulated with just a little bit of simple code!

Adrienne also added that she is very thankful for the funding provided by AAUW; it has given her the time to pursue her research interests while also keeping up with her class work.

Adrienne has already met with Winnie Weinrich, President of AAUW-KC Branch, to discuss a "guest appearance" at their Membership Meeting in January of 2015.

AAUW Missouri is very pleased to have Adrienne as our recipient and is especially looking forward to her commitment to help young people develop scientific-thinking skills.

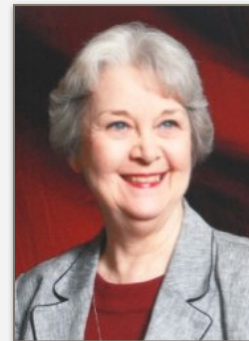

Jane Biers - Leadership in Action

Service takes many forms in AAUW. Jane Biers, an archaeologist, museum curator, author and editor, has many talents to share. With a long history in higher education at MU-Columbia, Jane is particularly drawn to AAUW's work with young women as we engage them in AAUW's mission. To that end, she became interested in the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) and the opportunities it offers young women. Jane has been instrumental in having MU-Columbia send students to NCCWSL and also recruiters from MU's Graduate School.

Jane was asked to serve as Missouri AAUW's College/University (C/U) Relations chair in 2006. With that assignment, she became even more aware of the efforts AAUW is making to reach out to young women in colleges and universities through the Elect-Her campaign trainings, the National Student Advisory Council and Campus Action Projects. In 2009, Jane took on the task of organizing an AAUW Student Organization at MU-Columbia, and it has been a great success. All this led Jane to submit an application in that year to serve on the national College/University Relations Committee, a ten-member group that helps direct the efforts of the College/University Relations program.

Service at the national level brings you in contact with many dynamic and powerful women, one of whom was Carol Virostek, then chair of the C/U Relations national committee.

She and Jane shared many common goals for their work, and eventually Jane was asked to serve as Carol's co-chair on the national committee, a position Jane currently holds.

Asked why she took the step to move up to the national level, Jane replied, "I felt that my experience as state C/U Relations chair and my academic training could be of use to the C/U partner program, particularly in helping make the free e-student membership program for undergraduates work more effectively."

You just never know where service to national AAUW will take you. When the Clinton Global Initiative University (CGI U) came to St. Louis in 2013 on the Washington University campus, Jane was asked to be part of the AAUW delegation to that event. AAUW is a strategic partner of the CGI. Of that opportunity, Jane noted, "It was an incredible experience. All those bright young students with their commitment to making their projects work were truly encouraging for the future of this country and elsewhere."

When asked about the duties of the national College/University Relations Committee, Jane indicated they have several key guidelines:
 ...Collaborate with staff to market and implement the college/university partner member program.

...Collaborate with staff to develop C/U support for and participation in the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL).

...Serve as the Campus Action Project grants selection panel.

...Collaborate with staff as needed to address other issues regarding colleges and universities, their students, branch C/U relationships, and programs that serve the C/U communities.

...Meet periodically via conference calls, e-mail, or other electronic means when required.

A few key initiatives for the coming years include:

1. Recruit and retain C/U partner members.
2. Consistent with the goals of the national Board, encourage diversity in AAUW student registration and C/U partner memberships.
3. Market and implement the C/U Partner program.
4. Collaborate with other AAUW national committees such as the Membership Committee to establish shared objectives, review progress, and spread the word about the C/U partner program.

We are very proud in Missouri of Jane Biers and her service to national AAUW. We hope some of you will also consider submitting your application to serve on a national committee, be on a review panel or run for national office. AAUW allows many ways to serve and advance our mission.

This open comment process is one way AAUW stays in touch with the issues that members care about. Visit the AAUW website at aauw.org to review before the deadline on November 15. Final voting on the Public Policy Program will occur at the National Convention in San Diego in June. As you know, the Public Policy Program is the document that drives our efforts at all levels-national, state and local. AAUW branches are bringing to a close their big push to attract new members to their branches. Many branches are taking advantage of Shape the Future, a membership campaign that is a recruitment tool for branches to offer a discounted rate to prospective members. NATIONAL REPORT FALL/WINTER 2014

The elections are over and there is a bit of good news from the general dismay. For the first time in history, there are 100 women in Congress 80 in the House and 20 in the Senate. It is a long way from parity, but it is a start. Remember, our motto is "50/50 by 2020." Make your plans now to attend the National Convention in San Diego June 18-21, 2015. Best rates on registration are available until December 31, 2014. The AAUW website has a brief first take on the amazing planned workshop topics.

This is the time when we elect new national officers. In February and March 2015 materials will be available on the AAUW website and in Outlook containing the bios of the candidates. A paper ballot can be requested on April 1, 2015, and on April 15, on-line voting opens. Help determine the direction of this exceptional organization by casting your ballot.

The National Board has adopted a revised fundraising policy. It is Policy 501. Become familiar with the new regulations, especially if your branch does extensive fundraising. Several helpful leadership aids are on the website. Quick Facts sheets deal with current policy issues such as Common Core, STEM, Pay Gap, Health Care, Title IX, etc.

Leader Essentials are guides to help member leaders in their officer/committee roles. They are available for LAF, Public Policy, Archiving, Programming, C/U Partners, Fellowships and Grants, International, Membership, STEM, and Marketing and Visibility. Look for the new research report Moving the Needle: Women in Engineering and Computing to be published early next year. The new term for the Supreme Court promises to deal with some important cases involving rights, especially as they affect women. Expect action on continued fallout from Burwell v. Hobby Lobby, restricting choice (targeted regulation of abortion providers), pregnancy discrimination (Young v. UPS), voting rights, and marriage equality. There are also two brand new items on pay equity, which will be valuable resources for a pay equity program or in preparation for Equal Pay Day April 14, 2015.

Remember to continue to take advantage of the Shape the Future program. For every two new members you recruit to your branch, you receive one free national membership to be distributed at your discretion.
