According to the 2018 Fact Sheet on the Status of Women in Missouri, at the current rate of "closing the gender pay gap," **women will not receive equal pay until 2066** - that is not a typo, until 2066. Can your great-great granddaughter wait that long?

OUR FIRST ASK: Every member take the Work Smart online course yourself, and if you're saying "I'm not looking for a job, I'm retired," then become an AAUW Work Smart ambassador - one who can address the issue and share our mission for Pay Equity and Closing the Gender Pay Gap.

AAUW MO Public Policy Focuses on Branch Actions

Pat Shores and Ellen Irons, Public Policy Co-Chairs

As the MO State Public Policy Committee, our job is to encourage advocacy efforts and to provide information and support to our Missouri branches and members in their activities. In the Fall 2018 issue, we discussed that we are focusing on three action areas in Missouri for 2018-2019:

◆ "Get Out the Vote" ◆ "The Protection and Enforcement of Title IX" ◆ "Closing the Gender Pay Gap"

The "Get Out the Vote" activities were very successful this year, with most branches taking at least one action and sometimes launching multiple events. Our state-wide efforts assisted in the passage of two propositions that AAUW Missouri supported: **Amendment 1**: Lobbying, Campaign Finance and Redistricting Initiative and **Proposition B**: Raising Minimum Wage.



"The Protection and Enforcement of Title IX" efforts kicked into gear on November 16, 2018, when

national sent our an Action Alert to members and branches about the newly released Department of Education's proposed changes to Title IX. The proposed changes would weaken Title IX's protections significantly. Our actions included:

- Members were encouraged to individually sign on to AAUW National's petition and to also submit comments through the Federal Register commentary page. The links were sent via email to branch presidents and public policy leaders.
- Per national's request, we wrote comments representing the AAUW MO State organization and submitted them to national for posting to the *Federal Register*.
- The comment period was open through January 28, 2019, and has now closed.

"Closing the Gender Pay Gap" is our current focus. We encourage branches to hold their own activities, attend our state meeting in May, and respond to our alerts on selected legislation in the Missouri legislature. Our work has included:

- Hard copy packets on "Closing the Gender Pay Gap" sent to each branch in December 2018.
- Reviewing and identifying pay equity-related bills to be monitored in the 2019 legislative session.
 HB145 "Ellington; Brandon Equal Pay for Equal work"
 HB328 "Beck Prohibits employers from inquiring about an employee or applicant's salary history information"
 SB95 "Sifton Modifies provisions relating to employee past wages being discussed when hiring"
- Letters sent to new and incumbent legislators to build partnership relationships and invite them to sponsor pay equity legislation.
- Branches sent "The Fight for Pay Equity: A Federal Road Map," an excellent document from national showing where Missouri and all other states are with recommended legislation to support pay equity. Equal-Pay-Laws-by-State
- Signed AAUW MO onto the *"Paycheck Fairness Act* organizational sign-on letter" prepared by National.

Yvonne noted, "To be on a national committee offers you an insight on how our organization actually works and allows you to be involved in the process. You are given a chance to meet and to work





What States are Best and Worst for Equal Pay

Work Smart—Know Your Worth

AAUW has been ramping up its <u>Work Smart initiative</u> by expanding workshops in communities, cities, and states across the U.S. Now, with the recent launch of <u>Work Smart Online</u>, the program is poised to accelerate toward its ambitious goal of **training 10** million women in salary negotiation by 2022.

"<u>Work Smart</u> and <u>Start Smart</u> (the version for college students), are key components of our multipronged effort to chip away at the gender wage gap," explains Gloria Blackwell, AAUW senior vice president of fellowships and programs. She says that, obviously, negotiating salary alone won't put women on par with men in terms of wages. AAUW works with lawmakers and also employers to change policies, practices, and workplace cultures around pay discrimination.

"But we also know that women are less likely than men to negotiate for salaries and raises. In fact, men are four times more likely to negotiate," Blackwell continues. "So, training people to do so is another way to move the needle on closing the gender pay gap."

AAUW's <u>Work Smart</u> curriculum is based on the best research on how to best navigate the complexity of job offers and promotions. Through presentations and interactive exercises, participants learn to research fair and equitable salaries and benefits in their fields (and geographic areas) and to clearly tout AAUW National has requested that all AAUW members take the one-hour web based curriculum— and then ask 20 women to do the same. The course is free, but requires registration. <u>https://courses.aauw.org/learn</u>.

Some branches are making an event out of this. Members take the course by themselves, Then have a branch meeting to review and discuss the content.

the skills and experience they bring to the table. Participants also learn the precise words and tactics to use when negotiating, all of which helps build the necessary confidence to negotiate a fair salary or promotion.

To help reach the bold goal of getting 10 million women trained in salary negotiation by 2022, AAUW issued a **"Members Mobilize a Million"** challenge, asking everyone to share the course with at least 20 people in their network. "It's a great program, and we know that it works," says Blackwell, citing surveys showing that women overwhelmingly reported high levels of satisfaction from the course. "Our priority now is to get as many people as possible to take the online course so we can meet our goal – and continue our overall mission of closing the gender wage gap — hopefully before 2030."
