About 100 people attended the installation of an historic roadside marker on July 3, 2022, in St. Louis commemorating the 1916 Golden Lane demonstration where 8000 suffragists silently lined Locust Street to demand the right to vote.

Cynthia Holmes, from the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites, spoke about the March of the Suffragists, the NCWSH site, and the Pomeroy family funding of four markers in Missouri.

The AAUW MO Board extended the "Votes for Women Trail Project." Many branches did not have time to work on this last year because of the pandemic and/or competing priorities. Still, this is an important state project, so we will give it more time, including a listing on the 2022–23 Star Award/Branch Action Plan. The St. Louis Branch has identified two women it is actively working on: Victoria Haley and Cynthelia Knefler. Columbia and Kirkwood-Webster Groves are actively working on names, and several other branches are considering starting research in the coming months. ### Inclusion Infusion from your AAUW MO DEI Committee

The purpose of 'Inclusion Infusion' is to introduce, in small segments, various elements of DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion) to members at every opportunity. Often just raising the topic of diversity brings negative feelings. By slowly exposing your members to thoughts and ideas relating to DEI, it is our hope that we will then be able to delve deeper into more meaningful activities and membership outreach, all while keeping DEI at the forefront of everything we do.

There will be 10+ 'Inclusion Infusion' topics to choose from, so you can include them with your program topic as you choose. You may also prepare your own topics. The DEI Committee will continue to add to the list. Topics will be shared with branch presidents.

In the 2022-23 academic year, AAUW awarded over \$6 million in fellowships and grants to 320 women and community projects. Fourteen AAUW endowments have been established by AAUW Missouri, Missouri branches, and AAUW Missouri members. These endowments sponsor fellowships and grants every year.

This year, five fellows and four grants have been sponsored. There is one fellow studying in Missouri. **Shakira Azeez Salami** from Ghana has received an International Fellowship to help her achieve a master in science degree with a specialization in health promotion and prevention. She is a student at Missouri State University in Springfield. Her goal is to start a non-governmental organization that will be involved in planning, implementing, and evaluating health-promotion programs. Further information:

Have you made your annual donation to AAUW? AAUW is counting on member financial support to meet our budget that covers programs, communications, research, public policy, and administration. Once again, the AAUW Board has had to approve a smaller budget than the previous year. Members' dues cover 20 percent of the budget. Eighty percent of the budget must come from member donations, investments, corporations, and foundations.

Each of our branches has an AAUW Fund chair to promote, inform, inspire, and collect your donations. AAUW MO keeps track of each branch's giving during the calendar year. The Missouri Star Award & Branch Action Plan 2022–23 has set our goals:

- 1. \$30 per capita giving.
- 2. One Century Club Member per 25 branch members.
- 3. One Century Club Plus member per 50 branch members.
- 4. 50 percent of branch members giving individually to the Greatest Needs Fund. Eight months have passed. There is still time for you to send your contribution to keep AAUW a vital force in our fight for gender equity.

# College University Committee Ready to Get Back on Campus! CU Relations Chair Debra McArthur

The College University committee has been busy and is about to get even busier! School is starting soon on our partner campuses, and we have lots of plans to be there to promote AAUW student membership.

In the Kansas City area, committee members **Sue Shineman**, **Barbara Leabo**, **Gail James**, and **Debra McArthur** have tabling events scheduled at UMKC, Park University, Maple Woods Community College, Kansas City Kansas Community College, and Blue River Community College. Sue and Barbara will be doing voter registration at Blue River Community College.

The Parkville and KC Northland branches have a "Happy Birthday Title IX" event scheduled at Park University on August 29, featuring the female athletic director at Park and athletes. We will provide a birthday cake, and we hope to sign up college personnel for branch membership as well as student members. CU committee members are working to schedule similar events at other schools in our area.

Committee members in the St. Louis area are working together to organize similar outreach at their area schools. **Patty Murray** (Ferguson-Florissant) has been working on some new materials to use at college events that feature phone-friendly QR codes to guide students to our websites and other online AAUW resources.

We have also been following up on opportunities to sign on more CU partners, including State Fair Community College, UMSL, and Central Methodist University. Thanks to our committee members who are doing that work.

# Strategic Plan Changes to MO Star Award/Branch Action Plans in Place MO Action Plan Co-Chair Pat Shores and Branch Action Plan Co-Chair Diane Ludwig

The national AAUW Strategic Plan is the same for 2023, so Diane and Pat have worked to ensure that both the 2022–23 Missouri State and Branch Action Plans and the Star Award/Branch Action Plan are coordinated. Both documents will be useful as branches plan programs and events that further the AAUW Mission and Strategic Plans.

At the July 2022 board meeting, several updates were noted in the 2022–23 STAR Award/Branch Action Plan. All were discussed with board members and branch presidents prior to being added or edited. They include:

- ✓ Making DEI an integral part of branch leadership and activities and using the state-provided 'Infusion Inclusions' at branch meetings.
- ✓ Creating or holding a new-member orientation, buddy program or mentorship program to help strengthen membership.
- ✓ Using one of the state-created presentations for a branch program.
- ✓ Holding at least one Get Out the Vote (GOTV) activity for national, state, or local elections.
- ✓ Incorporating mission-based special interest group(s) into branch activities. Examples include book groups and lunch-and-learn discussions.
- ✓ Credit is also being given to branches that provided display boards of their Top Ten Achievements for our 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of AAUW MO in May 2022.

Star award forms are due on April 1, 2023, covering activities from April 1, 2022, through March 31, 2023. State board members monitor state activities around these strategic goals at every state board meeting.

# Title IX Proposed Rules Changes AAUW MO Public Policy Chair Alice Kitchen

As we have been anticipating for months, the federal Proposed Rule changes are open for public comment until September 12, 2022. Comments from AAUW members requested be sent to national AAUW before this date.

This is so important, as we have known for years that the full intent of Title IX has yet to be fulfilled. There have been huge cultural and gender expression changes as well as political shifts that have made the implementation of Title IX more difficult.

The public policy committee encourages you to read its final report on Title IX based on the climate survey (on sexual misconduct and assault) at our four

state public Universities: Universities of Missouri at Columbia, Kansas City, St. Louis, and Rolla. This will make it easier to know where to focus if you do not have more individual experiences with schools. https://aauw-mo.aauw.net/files/2022/05/AAUW-Ix-Final-Report3.pdf

# Your Vote Is Your Voice – What Can You Do? Get Out the Vote (GOTV)

AAUW's 2021–23 Public Policy Priorities are "shaped by our commitment to being nonpartisan" and "expanding voting rights." MO House Bill 1878, which goes into effect on August 28, 2022, is putting barriers in place that could impact many voters including our members.

#### Here's What YOU Can Do:

#### Inform:

- 1. Your AAUW members, friends, family that in the November 2022 election, you must show an unexpired state-issued photo ID or passport. NO other forms of ID will be allowed (e.g., voter ID card, student ID, recent utility bill). This could impact seniors who no longer drive, those who have no license, people with disabilities, students without IDs.
- 2. The deadline to register to vote is October 12
- 3. Share where to go for help: 1-866-our vote; vote411.org.
- 4. Display the voting signs that were given to every branch **Act:**
- 1. Connect with members asking if they're a registered voter.
- 2. Encourage everyone to make a voting plan.
- 3. Perhaps set up rides to polls.
- 4. Consider volunteering with MO Voter Protection Coalition on election day.

#### 1965-voting-rights-act

Speaker Dr. Emilye Crosby, professor of history at SUNY Geneseo, will discuss the significance of the *1965 Voting Rights Act* from a ground level view of the civil rights movement, and especially, the role of women in its successful passage. Rather than the conventional top-down lens that focuses on visible leaders like Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Dr. Crosby will examine the role of ordinary people in the movement who did the hard work of grassroots organizing.

Almost 60 years after the passage of the *Voting Rights Act,* lessons from bottom-up history are more important than ever. Professor

# Crosby is a significant young scholar of the civil rights movement. Her book about the activists in a Mississippi community, *A Little Taste of Freedom*, won the Mississippi Historical Society book prize and an honorable mention from the Organization of American Historians for the Liberty Legacy Prize.
