AAUW Missouri's 2022–23 State Conference had 69 people in attendance via Zoom as we heard from great speakers, conducted our business meeting, and announced awards to branches and individuals. Technology allowed national **AAUW Board Vice Chair Malinda Gaul** to join us from San Antonio, Texas. She shared current news at AAUW, including awarding \$6.5 million in fellowships and grants for 2023 –24, our success in championing student debt reform, and a commitment that 'we won't

settle.' A lively Q&A session followed as members asked questions relating to branches, state, and national issues.

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We then turned our attention to the issue of important intellectual freedom. **Colleen Norman**, chair of the Intellectual Freedom Committee for Missouri Public Library system, presented "Censure, Cancellations, and Bannings." Her insights and comments on this foundational freedom were not lost on AAUW Missouri members. **Norman** also had a lively Q&A session. Our thanks to both these dynamic presenters!

The state conference always includes a time to celebrate our successes. Several key awards were presented. AAUW MO branches received recognition for achievement in fulfilling Branch Action Plans via the STAR Award (p.5) presented by **Diane B. Ludwig**, program vice president. We are proud that we again have 14 of 16 branches receiving STAR Awards and that 11 of the 14 are 10-Star Branches this year!

Special recognition was given to **Ardy Pearson,** Kansas City Branch, for her major gift to AAUW Fund. Ardy has always been a leader, as she still is today with her generosity.

Teri Brecht has been a member of AAUW St. Charles Branch since 1992 where she served many years as branch president and of course many other offices as well. She continues to serve the branch and the STL IBC in lots of ways. In 2014 she was the recipient of the Barbara Lackritz AAUW Service Award and in 2017 received the AAUW Presidential Service Award. She is a Century Club Plus member. Teri has served on the

State Nominating Committee and currently co-chairs the AAUW Incentive Grant Committee.

Teri taught for 28 years and contributed greatly to the science, math, and computer clubs. She also developed classroom units for Women's History Month. Since retirement, she is active in the St. Charles Chapter of Missouri Retired Teachers Association.

In addition to AAUW, Teri is dedicated to her church and received the Mission Woman of the Year Award in 2018 from the United Methodist Women. She served as UMW President and nearly every other office, including Regional District Treasurer. She loves

to sing and can be found sharing her beautiful voice in many different choral groups. Regardless of what organization Teri is a member of, one thing is for certain, you will see her in leadership roles.

Marsha Koch joined the Kirkwood-Webster Groves Branch in 1984 and has served as president, program vice president, membership vice president, and newsletter editor. She helped her branch establish STEM scholarships for high school girls. Previously she chaired and was secretary of the St. Louis

Marsha volunteers at tabling events and has created and presented programs on numerous topics to other branches. She presented programs to the public at the St. Louis County Library about Work Smart. Marsha is also an activist with other like-minded organizations. She was instrumental in designing and distributing the Get Out the Vote yard signs: one for the 19th Amendment and another to

Marsha taught business education and computer software education prior to becoming the Director of Administration – Information Services Technology at **Washington University**. The College/University Committee has been active this spring on campuses on both sides of the state. St. Louis branch members set up a table at a luncheon event at Saint Louis University (SLU). The AAUW table drew the attention of SLU students, and six of them joined AAUW.

In the Kansas City area, we held Pay Equity events at Blue River Community College and UMKC, and we enrolled more new members from both of those schools as well. [Photo: Students enjoyed our "Who Wants to Be (83% of) a Millionaire" game and learned about the pay gap.]

In March, CU Relations Chair **Debra McArthur** accompanied **Karen Francis** and Sue Shineman on a visit to the Nevada Branch. Branch members arranged a luncheon at **Cottey College** with faculty and students. That

evening, we visited the Nevada branch meeting, and members were enthusiastic about becoming more involved on campus. Four Cottey students have joined AAUW, and we are making plans for participation on campus in the fall. In 2022–23 we held 13 campus events and recruited 132 student members!

It's the time of year again for most AAUW members to renew their membership. Starting this year, renewals will be on a rolling basis, based on when you renewed or joined the previous year. Members can check their profiles on the AAUW website if unsure of their date. Check with your branch membership chair if you have any questions. Total dues for members are due no later than June 30, 2023. National dues = \$72 (\$69 is tax deductible), State dues = \$10, and Branch dues vary.

Public Policy Updates

Public Policy Chair Alice Kitchen

1. Voter Education and Action

Members of our Public Policy Committee participate in the MO Voter Protection Coalition and join in every Monday for the latest information and suggested actions. Pam Meyers updates us on local election board operational issues. In our earlier meeting we met with Vincent Heithholt and Denise Lieberman regarding voting access to persons with access challenges. Each one of us agreed to go to a Senior Center in our area and do an educational updating on voting access.

2. Title IX

The new regulations on Title IX have been written and reviewed at the White House level but have not yet been released. Simultaneous to that, the Department of Education issued a ruling on transgender students.

3. Transgender Legislation in Missouri Legislature

Deb McArthur, Sue Shinneman and I had a conference call with the Women's Law center expert on transgender issues. Shiwali Patel and Auden Perino are the designated staff on trans youth regarding the role of Title IX in challenging the legislation and the cases that have gone before.

4. Library Defunding Attempts

Ann Schultis (former librarian) has kept us alerted to all the up-and-downs of Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft's attempts to force the libraries to censor books in various ways. Recently Ann reports that the funds were returned to the budget. I sent a letter on behalf of our Public Policy Committee to Ashcroft as did many of our members.

Our state Public Policy Committee featured state updates which were provided by state **Representative Emily Weber**, 24th District and federal updates from **Kathleen Farrell**, League of Women Voters, St. Louis.




their work on this website. The committee recommends the video Women in Science Who Changed the World available on YouTube. It is valuable for elementary and middle school students.

STEM in the News

- One in five women earn engineering degrees. Less than 30 percent of researchers in science are women.
- A new study finds that women improve cyber skills risk management by bringing new perspectives and skills to the decision making process.
- CryptoComics is a curriculum designed to teach elementary students, particulary girls of color, about cyber security, the practice of keeping digital information safe. This is the science of making and breaking CODES. CryptoComics is freely available on <u>cryotocomics.org</u>. Read about it on Women in STEM, University of Florida.

Votes for Women Trail Honors Alma Nash of Maryville Debra McArthur, Parkville Branch

On March 24, 2023, AAUW members gathered with others in Maryville Missouri for the dedication of a marker to honor Alma Nash, who led the Missouri Ladies Military Band in the National Women's Suffrage Parade in Washington, D.C. in 1913. Originally, the band was positioned in the middle part of the parade, but when protestors attempted to disrupt the parade by harassing those at its start, Nash was asked to bring the band to the front to get the parade moving. In this way, the ladies from Missouri led the parade on that historic occasion. Funded by the Pomeroy Foundation, the plaque is positioned in Downtown

Pocket Park near the central square of Maryville. Alyssa Ford PhD,

Thank you to all Task Force members and the state-wide branch members who fought to get 100-year proclamations, who created and distributed suffragist signs, and who celebrated the exceptional women who fought to get the vote.

Votes for Women Missouri Trail Project

One new site and three new individuals were added to the Missouri Trail on the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites website. At Greenwood Cemetery, the burial site of more than 50,000 African Americans, we discovered three suffragists:

- o Maria L. Harrison was a founding member and a powerful leader in a variety of St. Louis groups.
- Mary Alice Ford Pitts played a leading role in a variety of St. Louis community organizations.
- o Arsania Williams was known in the African American community as the "Human Dynamo."
- o The Columbia and St. Louis branches will be adding three more women to the Trail soon.

AAUW MO collaborated with the Missouri League of Women Voters and Cynthia Holmes, the Missouri representative from the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites, **to celebrate the installation of four historic roadside markers**.

- July 3, 2022, the Golden Mile at the Schlafly Tap Room, 2100 Locust, St. Louis, where women stood to confront convention bound delegates about women having the vote.
- October 9, 2022, Anna H. Jones at the Second Baptist Church, 6320 East 39th Street, Kansas City, the site of a meeting of the Missouri State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs, which featured an address from President Anna Jones.
- October 15, 2022, **Virginia Minor** at Provident Counseling, 2652 Olive, St. Louis, which was the site of one of her homes.
- March 24, 2023, Alma Nash at a pocket park at Main Street and Third Street in Maryville. Alma was the lead woman in the Missouri Ladies Military Band in the National Women's Suffrage Parade in D. C. and the Suffrage Tour of Central Missouri in 1913.

19th Amendment Centennial Celebration Task Force

The AAUW MO 19th Amendment Centennial Celebration Taskforce, led by **Ellen Irons**, was formed in May 2019, to encourage, educate, and inspire branches to focus on the Amendment Centennial. We worked through the pandemic and had many great successes, including:

- o Branches obtained 19 Proclamations celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment.
- The program "Women's Suffrage, Racism and Intersectionality" was presented via Zoom on August 26, 2021, one
 year after the 19th Amendment Centennial. The panelists were April Langley PhD and Carmaletta Williams PhD.
 Over 100 people attended from six states.
- We provided direction and encouragement to the National Votes for Women Missouri Trail project led by Pat Shores.
- An archival article and a master list of resources were published, then later updated, and are now available by request.

The St. Charles Branch celebrated its 2023 Science & Math Awards & Dessert Night. Linda Dencker presented math or science awards to local high school seniors from seven area high schools. Students, parents, and teachers attended the 29th Annual Awards. In the two previous years, Covid prevented meeting in-person, so certificates were hand-delivered by Linda to each high school.

Each student presented a short speech, and numerous honorees credited teachers for inspiring them to excel in school and in life. Several honorees mentioned giving extra time to organize food bank collections,



mentoring fellow students, or serving as student liaison to the school board resulting in positive suggestions for change.

Boonville Branch AAUW Co-president Carol Cox presented a \$1000 scholarship to **Emma Neidig** during the Boonville High School awards ceremony. Emma will attend the Hammons School of Architecture at Drury University in Springfield, Missouri. The scholarship is presented to a young woman interested in a STEM career with a GPA above 3.25. Emma states that she appreciates the teachers who

Emily Baker, Boonville High School junior, received a scholarship to Missouri Girls State that will be held June 24–July 1,2023 at Lindenwood University in St. Charles, Missouri. The American Legion Auxiliary established the Girls State Program. It focuses on the roles of active citizen participation in local government and policy, law, international affairs, journalism, and commerce. Lindenwood University will award two hours of political science credit to individuals successfully completing the week.

At the state conference, **Maryellen McVicker**, **PhD**., chair of a unique program in 2020, which was to celebrate the 100th anniversary of women getting the vote, complete with foods and attire from the 1920's. She shared how the \$300 grant from AAUW MO Incentive Grants helped them hold the event and raise funds to provide local Scholarships. With Covid 19 delays, the event finally occurred in 2022 and was a great success

Thompson explained explicit and implicit bias in detail.

Explicit bias, both individual and systemic, is often directly associated with personal prejudice and institutional discrimination. Implicit individual, cognitive bias can include errors in our thinking that we make by taking shortcuts in our decisions. Our branch is very grateful to our DEI/Public Policy Chair **Lisa Taylor** for making this presentation possible.


