Seneca Falls Convention - 1848

- This was the first <u>women's rights</u> convention. It advertised itself as "a convention to discuss the social, civil, and religious condition and rights of woman".
- It was held in the <u>Wesleyan Chapel</u> of the town of <u>Seneca Falls</u>, <u>New York</u>, it spanned two days over **July 19–20**, **1848**.
- Attracting widespread attention, it was soon followed by other women's rights conventions, including the <u>Rochester Women's Rights Convention</u> in <u>Rochester</u>, New York, two weeks later. In 1850 the first in a series of annual <u>National Women's Rights Conventions</u> met in Worcester, <u>Massachusetts</u>.

On July 19, 1848, the women of Seneca Falls, New York, including Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott, challenged America to social revolution with a list of demands that touched every aspect of life—property rights, employment, education, divorce and custody laws, and social freedoms. The Seneca Falls gathering became known as the first convention for women's rights. By the early 1900's a



coalition of suffragists, progressive politicians and social welfare organizations gathered a successful push for the vote.

On July 19, 2023, the women of AAUW in Independence gathered to celebrate the 175th anniversary of the Seneca Falls convention. AAUW members invited prospective new members, and a delicious brunch was served. Members of the Independence branch took this opportunity to share the mission and vision of AAUW. Planned programs and events for the coming year were also highlighted. Our guests were very interested and asked many questions about AAUW. This was a successful event to help celebrate past achievements of the women's rights movement and to help promote the continued efforts of AAUW to advance gender equity for women and girls through advocacy and education.

Invitations were sent to 14 people. Five people responded, but two had previous commitments. The Membership Co-Chairs, Barbara Leabo and Karen Johnson, hosted the event. Of the three that attended, one has joined. She is Debra Horton.
