Plant a Yard Sign for Women's Right to Vote

100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment





AMENDMENT XIX ... The "right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

In 1848 the first women's rights convention was held in Seneca Falls, New York. After more than 60 years of organizing, meeting, protesting, hunger strikes, lobbying, marching, and of some women being beaten and imprisoned, women in every state were officially granted the legal right to vote. Of course, it took almost four decades for women of color to be able to fully exercise that right. Until the **24th Amendment** passed in 1964, women of color were denied their suffrage rights in many states through mechanisms such as poll taxes, literacy tests, and intimidation. In 1965 the passage of the **Voting Rights Act** protected voter registration and voting for racial (and at a later date language) minorities and corrected discriminatory election systems and districting. This history is part of the story and is now being brought to light in many centennial resources.
