Since the fall of *Roe v. Wade*, a patchwork of state laws have caused confusion and revealed stark differences in access across the country, with some states enacting abortion bans, and others strengthening protections and expanding access. Planned Parenthood has long been on the forefront of this very personal issue. Wellbery leads the policy and advocacy programs in Illinois and Missouri for a Planned Parenthood affiliate with health centers in both states. During this conversation-style session, she'll provide her on-the-ground perspective working in both a protective and restrictive state and share what has unfolded since the fall of *Roe*, the impact on patients, health care providers, and advocates, and how we can all engage in efforts to build reproductive rights and freedom.

B) Unconscious Assumptions and Implicit Bias: We All Have Them—Now What Do We Do WithThem? Deanie Brown, Attorney, Chief Diversity and Inclusion Officer, Illinois Judicial Branch (via ZOOM)

"Who me? Biased? That's not who I am!" That's likely our first reaction - a deeply felt and absolutely understandable response. But research confirms we begin to form instant associations as toddlers. These assumptions are often automatic and become reinforced through societal messages, persistent stereotypes, and shared norms, often contrary to our positive beliefs and good intentions. This presentation explores the ways what's known as implicit biases can cause harm and impede progress, and explores ways to recognize, interrupt, and counteract them in our lives and in our AAUW branches.

1) Gender Isn't Binary / AAUW Focus on Intersectionality (Room A)

Susan Halla, President, TransParent / Meghan Kissell, AAUW Senior Public Policy Director
Gender is a perception of self that comes from the brain. Today gender has become a coded political message and rallying cry, denying parents and transgender people of basic rights and humanity. Gender has long been distinct from sex .

After this presentation, you will come away with a deeper understanding of the differences between gender, sex, and sexuality, as Susan discusses her experience raising her transgender son and the impact it has had on their lives.

Censorship has been on the rise across the U.S. in recent years with 2022 seeing a startling number of censorship attempts reported to the American Library Association. Learn more about how your library could be impacted and what you can do to support your local library and community.

3) Ending Period Poverty (ZOOM Session) (Room C) Janai Harris, Director, More Chances Period

A recent survey shows 46 percent of young women have skipped a class because of menstruation. Skipping classes is knowledge lost. More Chances Period provides period supplies, free, so that doesn't happen. In 2022, the organization served 17,338 young women, mostly at schools. Learn what motivated founder, Janai Harris, to want to make a difference.

4) Gen Z Voting Issues and Public Safety (Room D) Rachel Gonzales, Social Justice Advocate

Rachel Gonzalez will present topics important to Gen-Z, including voting rights and the epidemic of gun violence. She began her career in advocating for issues at the age of 13. Learn from this dynamic young woman why she is so passionate about what she does. Gen Z is looking at things with new eyes and in new ways—come talk to this young leader in her field.

5) On Tribal Lands (Room A) Donna Becker, Native American Advocate; Program VP, AAUW Kansas

This session will focus on awareness of Native American tribes' dispossession of their ancestral lands by European colonial settlers, which destroyed not only hundreds of thousands of lives but an entire way of life. Considered will be Manifest Destiny, the Indian Removal Act, assimilation, and tribal sovereignty; issues of stereotypes and language;

Students shouldn't be political pawns. In the past few years, we have seen substantial threats to Title IX, the law that protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs. Learn more about what to expect with the proposed new Title IX rules from the Department of Education and hear about Congressional efforts to address gender-based harassment and discrimination in schools. We will also talk about the impact of debt-financed higher education, its impact on women, and steps being taken to address this.

7) Improving Maternal and Infant Outcomes in America - The Arkansas Story (ZOOM Session) (Room C) Zenobia Harris, Executive Director, Arkansas Birthing Project

The U.S. leads the industrialized world in our rate of maternal mortality and infant mortality. Unfortunately, Maternal Mortality in the U.S. has risen significantly over the past 10 years. Arkansas has the highest Maternal Mortality rate in the U.S. This presentation will explore the causes identified and interventions being promoted to address this dismal situation. Community based solutions including Doula support, Community Health workers and volunteer net-works are being promoted as an answer to the gaps which need to be filled in the care delivery system for pregnant women.

Denise Lieberman is a nationally recognized civil rights lawyer who has been on the front lines of voting rights debates in Missouri and around the country for 25 years. She serves as Director and General Counsel of the Missouri Voter Protection Coalition, a nonpartisan statewide network of voter advocates. Denise has testified in support of the John Lewis Voting Rights Act before Congress and previously served as director of Power & Democracy for Advancement Project National Office in Washington DC - a racial justice organization - where she brought lawsuits challenging discriminatory voting laws in states like Missouri, North Carolina, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Florida and others. Denise also serves as faculty director of the Voter Access and Engagement Initiative at Washington University in St. Louis, where she is an adjunct professor of law and political science. She has recently brought two lawsuits on behalf of the NAACP and LWV challenging Photo ID and Voter Registration Restrictions in a new Missouri voting law. In her role with the Missouri Voter Protection Coalition, Denise coordinates statewide nonpartisan Election Protection efforts in Missouri. She previously served as legal director of the ACLU of Eastern Missouri, and headed the Don't Shoot Coalition in the wake of the killing of Mike Brown in Ferguson.

The United States flag being displayed in the opening ceremony of our 2023 AAUW Central States Regional Conference, October 19-21, 2023, in St. Louis, MO, is one of 130 flags that flew over the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C., on January 14, 2012, honoring the 130th Anniversary of AAUW's founding organization's first general meeting. AAUW later gifted this flag to AAUW Missouri.

The Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA) held that first organizational meeting in Boston, MA, on January 14, 1882. Records note that 65 women, graduates of eight colleges and universities (Boston, Cornell, Michigan, Oberlin, Smith, Vassar, Wellesley, and Wisconsin) were in attendance. Today, AAUW still honors that original mission and continues to promote education and equity for all women and girls. We are proud to honor our heritage by using this historic American flag at our conference.
