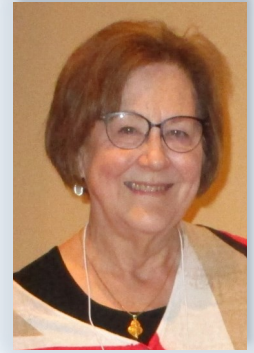

We all stand in awe of the suffragists who worked for voting rights for women with courage and tenacity. These women spoke, wrote, petitioned, marched, traveled the country, and participated in demonstrations. Some were even arrested or suffered injuries. One of the early

twentieth century suffragists, Alice Paul, participated in hunger strikes and picketed the White House for two years. She planned the 1913 Woman Suffrage Parade in Washington DC.

We are fortunate that today AAUW provides us with an easier way to advocate – starting right at our computer. People (not just members) can begin by signing up for the **Two Minute Activist**, which alerts people to important issues and connects them with the email addresses of their legislative representatives. One of the important issues on AAUW's agenda is the *Paycheck Fairness Act*, which will update the *Equal Pay Act* of 1963. This update is hardly a radical agenda; it simply closes the loopholes in the Act, which has weakened over the past 56 years.

People can sign up by going to the AAUW.org website, going to Take Action, and then to the [Two Minute Activist](#) and filling out a short form. An alternate way to participate is to text AAUW to 21333 to receive text messages.



One of the ways our branch has been advocating is through our *Get Out the Vote Signs*, designed with the League of Women Voters-St. Louis. These signs encourage people to find out about the issues and candidates in their area when they are deciding how to vote. As we are getting nearer to the fall election, we are looking for new ways to market our signs, which we have sold for \$5.00 to community people with discounts to AAUW members.

The signs remind people to vote and, with the contact information, help them to be informed voters. Please submit any ideas you have about the signs or other advocacy projects to one of us or to a board member.

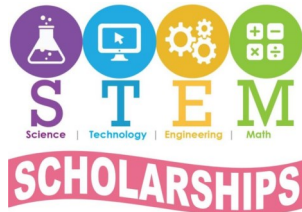

program and a social justice leadership group called FOCUS Youth Leadership St. Louis. She is considering Loyola University Chicago, Saint Louis University, or



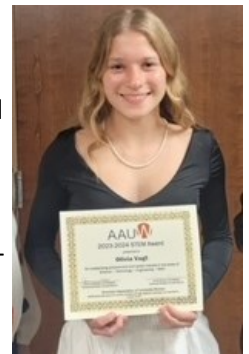

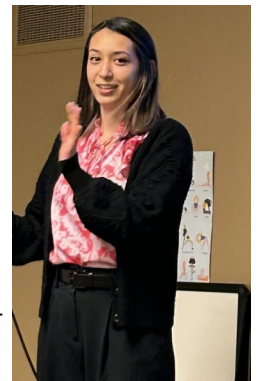


Valley Park High School: Olivia Vogt

ADVOCATE BY JOINING THE MISSOURI RIGHT TO READ COALITION

Recently, AAUW KWG advocated for our public libraries by joining forces with other organizations to oppose legislation that places restrictions on libraries.

Missouri ranks third nationally for books banned at school libraries. Under a new law, school librarians are subject to fines and/or imprisonment. A policy effective in 2023 could result in the state's withholding funds from Missouri's public libraries.

The statewide [Missouri Right to Read Coalition](#) supports the premise that Missouri's libraries must remain an open, accessible resource for books and other materials available free-of-charge to the public.

The organization opposes attempts to restrict access to public and school libraries, instead placing confidence in trained, experienced librarians and educators to evaluate and select materials available to the public. Membership in the Right to Read Coalition is open to organizations and individuals who support the coalition's purpose.

for undergraduate students. We also had a chance to meet faculty members and entice them to get their feet wet in AAUW affairs. We provided simple snacks and beverages.




AAUW METRO ST LOUIS INTERBRANCH COUNCIL (IBC)

Join the Movie Group

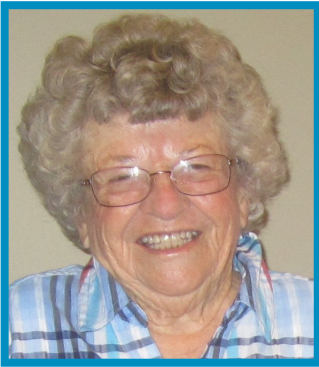

Grace Butler Tribute Project

AAUW MO Special Donation to AAUW Greatest Needs Fund

In Memory of Grace Butler, AAUW Leader and Mentor About Missouri's Amazing Grace

William Shakespeare's quote: "*And though she be but little, she is fierce*" perfectly described Grace. So much so that her family incorporated it into her memorial service. Grace was small in stature, just under five feet, but fierce in determination. To know Grace was to respect her. She worked tirelessly to make a difference in the lives of women and girls. Her AAUW career started in Pennsylvania and then moved to Columbia, Missouri, as Grace returned home after her husband passed away in 1975. Grace raised her four boys, worked as an academic advisor at the University of Missouri, and continued her AAUW career dedicated to helping women succeed.



In her more than six decades of service, Grace held many AAUW positions. She was president of AAUW Missouri from 1991-1993 and went on to become Southwest Central Regional Director for two terms, covering Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas. In that role, she served on the national level as well. Most every state president in Missouri that worked with Grace has high praise for this little lady. She was filled with enthusiasm, wonder, excitement, and passion. She could enthral a crowd with one of her stories of life on her farm and then give another life-lesson about the issues facing women and girls. She was involved, she was committed, she was caring - and she got results! Thus, she was frequently called "Amazing Grace." To those who knew and worked with her, she certainly was! Grace passed on October 11, 2023, just one month shy of her 97th birthday. **It is an honor for AAUW MO to present this tribute project for Grace. We hope you will join us.**

 - o The current number of votes in represents 19.1% of membership. 7,753 electors voted in last year's campaign in total, and we have already surpassed that number, in large part due to your efforts.

Sal Valadez (diversity, outreach and marketing representative for the Laborers International Union of North America-Midwest Region) and **Moji Sidiqi** (director for multicultural affairs and Afghan outreach for the International Institute of St. Louis) will share their personal stories of being immigrants to the US, finding their way to St. Louis, and their dedication to serving the immigrant populations in our area. Currently the St. Louis area has around 135,000 immigrants, which accounts for about 4.8% of the population.

April Was Child Abuse Prevention Month

There is no single definition of child abuse and neglect, as these terms are defined by federal and state laws. At the federal level, *The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act* (CAPTA) defines child abuse and neglect as “any recent act or failure to act on the part of a parent or caregiver that results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse, or exploitation, or an act or failure to act that presents an imminent risk of serious harm.” In Missouri, physical abuse is defined as any injury inflicted on a child by other than accidental means by those responsible for the child’s care, custody and control. Neglect occurs when those responsible for care, custody and control fail to provide proper or necessary support; education as required by law; nutrition; or medical, surgical or any other care necessary for the child’s well-being. Missouri includes sexual abuse/exploitation as a form of neglect and specifically includes victims of sex trafficking or other severe forms of trafficking.
