Writing About Victoria Clay Haley, the Black Suffragist: The Power of Writing Plays

About a year ago, our branch president, Ellen Irons, asked me to participate in the "National Votes for Women Trail" project by researching a suffragist who lived in St Louis in the early 1900s. I chose to focus on an African-American suffragist named Victoria Clay Haley. While writing a report about Victoria, I found myself rather frustrated with the lack of information about her. Though some newspaper articles from this period described her speaking engagements, I found little to no information on her actual speeches. I wanted to know her exact words. How did she inspire and organize the Negro women's clubs to fight for women's right to vote? What were her thoughts? I submitted a summary on Victoria's life for the project, but I wanted to know more about her.

When Black History Month rolled around in February, I thought to myself, why not write a play on Victoria for my older adults group at the YMCA and also for AAUW. I chose to call the play, *The Black Suffragist and the Harlem Hellfighter*. In developing the characters and dialogue, I used both primary and secondary sources. Thanks to the staff at the St. Louis Public Library and the University of Missouri Mercantile Library, I read how Victoria travelled throughout the country organizing and speaking at different venues. Not only a suffragist, Victoria was an educator, clubwoman, bank executive, and fundraiser.

Part of the play was performed by members of AAUW St. Louis Branch, who did a reading involving Victoria's (continued on page 3)



About National Women's Equality Day

Although the 19th Amendment was first introduced in 1878, it was not added to the Constitution until August 18th 1920, a full 42 years after its initial introduction. According to the Constitution Center, it was

later made an official part of the Constitution on August 26th when then-U.S. Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby signed a proclamation certifying the amendment. This date of certifi*cation* is the date Women's Equality Day commemorates.

Rep. Bella Abzug spearheaded the passage of legislation in 1971 which led to Congress designating August 26th as Women's Equality Day. Although not an official federal holiday, the United States has marked Women's Equality Day each year since 1973.

What we are celebrating

- \Rightarrow Women's Equality Day honors the women's suffrage movement in the U.S. and remembers the hurdles women had to overcome in their stride towards progress.
- \Rightarrow It reminds us to talk about the racism and discrimination and barriers that were (and are) present in the history of obtaining women's suffrage.
- \Rightarrow It's a day to honor women's contributions, recognize their impact on the country, and celebrate their work in various industries.
- \Rightarrow It's also a time to reflect on areas where there's still room for growth and to consider how women can continue to advance equality and inclusion.

Directions and Parking Information

The library is handicap accessible. The St. Louis County Library Clark Family Branch is a stunning, two-story building on Lindbergh Blvd, encompassing 74,000 square feet. It replaced the former headquarters building, and is now the largest branch in the St. Louis County Library District. It is newly opened as of July 9, 2024, and located at 1640 S Lindbergh Blvd, St. Louis, MO 63131. There is ample parking in the lots surrounding the library.




going uninvited to an all-white suffragists conference in St. Louis. In this segment, Edna Fischel Gellhorn, the chair of the conference and co-founder of the League of Women's Voters and the St. Louis Branch of AAUW, welcomes her to the conference; but the hotel management and other suffragists argue about whether she should stay or leave. Another highlight of the play is when Victoria meets and introduces Sergeant Henry Johnson, a World War I hero and recipient of the Medal of Honor, who gives a fiery speech at the Coliseum in St. Louis. I learned quite a bit about Victoria's internal

struggles for the right of women to vote and for the civil rights of African Americans and how both were at times in conflict.

The play has also been performed by the Active Older Adults group at the YMCA and at St. Louis Village. It was accepted by the International Black Theatre Festival in Winston-Salem, NC, held in July 2024. The festival is every two years. The first day of the festival, I attended a meeting for all new playwrights who had their work selected for the Reader's Theatre at the festival. We were each given envelopes with the date and time of our reading and were told to (continued on page 5)

for the meeting program. The rehearsal went well, and other members arrived with food and festive moods. Sixteen members and one guest enjoyed our potluck luncheon.

After lunch, Sheila Bassoppo-Moyo and branch members presented a re-enactment of one of the key scenes from Sheila's original play featuring Victoria Clay, Edna Gellhorn, Cynthelia Knefler, and others. This version of the play is entitled "The Suffragists Taking a Stand." The re-enactment group dressed in white and had various adornments - hats, mustaches (the hotel manager) and more. This version focuses on a key scene when Victoria is initially denied entrance to a 1913 suffragists convention in St. Louis due to her race. Through vigorous support by Edna, Cynthelia, and others, Victoria is ultimately allowed to stay. The arguments made and the strong



contact the actors ourselves. When I opened my envelope, I learned that my reading would be the following day, on Wednesday! Of course, I was shocked! Not only did I have to find my own actors, but a director and stage manager as well. I was told to look at a list of actors and directors with their phone numbers and start calling. So, I frantically started making phone calls. All my calls went to voicemail. Two people returned my messages. I just decided to ask people in the hotel lobby if they were actors or directors. Someone suggested that I go to the hotel bar at midnight and that I would be sure to find actors there. So I took copies of my script to the bar at night, around 11:30 pm, and happily found a director and all the actors I needed. They were pretty happy also by that time of night. The reading was held the next day before an audience of theatre people. I received very thoughtful and constructive feedback.

I'm really thankful to Ellen for reaching out to me about participating in the Votes for Women's Trail project. Learning and writing about Victoria Clay Haley has changed my life. I have also started work on another play and on ways to engage more older adults in telling their own stories for the stage.

Virginia Minor 200th Birthday Celebration Held at Bellefontaine Cemetery 6-22-2024

At 10 a.m. on Saturday June 22, 2024, AAUW St. Louis and our partner organizations continued the celebration of Virginia Minor's 200th birthday with an event at Virginia's graveside in Bellefontaine Cemetery at 4947 West Florissant Ave, St. Louis, MO.

This event was initiated by **Dan Fuller**, cemetery chronicler, Bellefontaine Cemetery Association, when he contacted Jan Scott and asked if we could arrange to bring the St. Louis City mayoral proclamation of Virginia's 200th birthday to Virginia's gravesite for a recognition ceremony and photos.

Jan immediately went to work and was able to arrange with **Nicole Evelina** to be the speaker. Nicole is the author of the definitive biography, America's Forgotten Suffragists: Virginia and Francis Minor. Nancy Price, an AAUW Ballwin-Chesterfield member who is jointly active with the League of Women Voters St. Louis, also helped with the program and shared remarks.

Fellowships and Grants Directory

- The Fellowships and Grants team is no longer utilizing our previous F&G Directory, and the awardees currently listed only go up to the 22-23 award year. Similar to the MSD, the directory was designed and updated by a staff member who has since retired, and it is unable to be maintained in its previous format. We have migrated all fellowship and grants data to Nimble/Community Hub, and the possibility of a similar directory in this system was explored. In the end, it was determined that building out such a directory in our current system was not feasible.
- With the support of the Advancement Committee, we to would like to gather feedback on how best to provide information about our fellows and grantees to our members and supporters. With feedback from this committee, along with industry best practices, we would like to ensure we steward our donors and share the impact their gifts are making to hundreds of women each year in the US and Internationally.
- Current awardees for the 24-25 cycle are still being finalized. We've had quite a few alternates for Ameri can Fellowships we are still confirming, which has delayed the process. Information for the 23-24 awardees has been shared by the Fellowships and Grants team by request.

Donations and Dues Processing

Racial justice is one of NOW's core issues. As NOW co-founder Rev. Dr. Pauli Murray said, "If one could characterize in a single phrase the contribution of Black women to America, I think it would be 'survival with dignity against incredible odds."



It's important to understand how race and gender bias can combine to create even more harm. Here's <u>a talk on</u> <u>"Intersectional Feminism" by Kimberlé Crenshaw</u>, who says, if you're standing in the path of multiple forms of exclusion, you're likely to get hit by both. That's why it's so important that we raise our own voices for racial justice—for if we don't speak out, who will?

A study by a team of research scientists examined why it's so hard to speak up for racial justice for some people. "Among White people, solidarity involves an unspoken agreement to protect their advantages and avoid discomfort by not confronting racist behavior. Studies find that even after anti-racism training, White people struggle to maintain their commitment to allyship. This ingroup solidarity keeps White people silent in the face of racism, fearing disapproval. We need to make it easier for everyone to take the risk of showing courage in standing up to racism and speaking out for racial justice. Mirowitz Center was the first organization in Missouri to be licensed to teach Senior Planet from AARP curriculum – and is the only one licensed to operate in St. Louis County!
