

# President Joe Biden on the Equal Rights Amendment, January 17, 2025

While there will be challenges ahead, AAUW remains steadfast in our fight to ensure full recognition of equality that cannot be undermined on account of sex. #ERANow



"I have supported the Equal Rights Amendment for more than 50 years, and I have long been clear that no one should be discriminated against based on their sex. We, as a nation, must affirm and protect women's full equality once and for all. On January 27, 2020, the Commonwealth of Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment. The American Bar Association (ABA) has recognized that the Equal Rights Amendment has cleared all necessary hurdles to be formally added to the Constitution as the 28th Amendment. I agree with the ABA and with leading legal constitutional scholars that the Equal Rights Amendment has become part of our Constitution. It is long past time to recognize the will of the American people. In keeping with my oath and duty to Constitution and country, I affirm what I believe and what three-fourths of the states have ratified: the 28th Amendment is the law of the land, guaranteeing all Americans equal rights and protections under the law regardless of their sex. "

U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, NY, led the effort to enshrine the Equal Rights Amendment in the constitution. On January 17, she issued the following statement:

"I want to praise President Biden for declaring that the Equal Rights Amendment is now a valid part of the Constitution. I am in full agreement with his argument, given that the ERA has met every requirement laid out in Article V of the Constitution. This fact, together with the president's proclamation and the backing of numerous legal experts, makes it clear that the ERA must now be considered the law of the land. This is an important day for reproductive freedom and a historic day for equality.

Now, millions of women living in states with restrictions on their reproductive freedoms can file lawsuits to overturn these unconstitutional laws that discriminate against people based on their sex. I urge them to do so, and I know they'll have abundant support for these efforts.

Our opponents will doubtless challenge us in court. But there is strong legal backing for our position, including from the American Bar Association, which has urged federal, state, local, territorial, and tribal governments to implement the 28th Amendment. The time for procedure is over—we must now move to implementation." Donna Medlin, past president of AAUW MO from 2002–04, passed away on December 13, 2024, in Springfield, Missouri at age 69. Donna was an active AAUW member in her Springfield Branch (now disbanded) and then enjoyed being a virtual member of the Boonville Branch in her hometown area. Donna left quite an AAUW legacy. She was president of the Springfield Branch in 2012–13, served the branch as finance officer, membership and program vice president, AAUW Funds, and other roles. At the state level she served as program

At the state level she served as program vice president and focused on branch and leadership development from 1999–2000. In that role, she helped develop the first state STAR Award program. It began with six areas for stars and set Missouri on a path for accountability and success. She was also co-editor of *Missouri in Motion*.

Donna served as AAUW MO president at a time when there were 27 Missouri branches. She loved using the AAUW Daisy Girl who believed that "Only those who attempt the absurd can achieve the impossible!"

She earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Missouri and a master's degree from the University of Central Oklahoma. Donna was a registered dietician and was involved with the American Dietetic Association, MU Alumni, and AAUW. We will all miss her sweet smile, her generous spirit, and her wonderful enthusiasm.

## Recent Findings for Cancer & its Prevention for Women and Younger Adults

Health Equity is a continuing work. Awareness is one of the critical factors to achieve health equity. The purpose of this article is to generate awareness about the recent findings for prevention of cancer. While there are many preventative steps one can take, this article highlights the new advisory on links between alcohol and cancer by the **US Surgeon General Vivek Murthy MD**. "Cancer rates are rising among women and younger adults.....Alcohol is a well-established, preventable cause of cancer that is responsible for about 100,000 cancer cases and 20,000 cancer deaths annually in the United States – greater than the 13,500 alcohol-associated traffic crash fatalities per year in the U.S. – yet the majority of Americans are unaware of this risk," said Murthy. <a href="https://www.hhs.gov/about/news/2025/01/03/us-surgeon-general-issues-new-advisory-link-alcohol-cancer-risk.html">https://www.hhs.gov/about/news/2025/01/03/us-surgeon-general-issues-new-advisory-link-alcohol-cancer-risk.html</a>.

Here are highlights from the new advisory:

- "Less than half of Americans are aware that alcohol consumption increases cancer risk."
- "Consuming alcohol increases the risk of developing at least 7 types of cancer– mouth, throat, esophagus, voice box, breast, liver, colon and rectum."
- "Higher alcohol consumption increases alcohol-related cancer risk in women and men."
- "About 5 more women out of 100 would develop cancer due to consumption of two drinks a day."
- "About 3 more men out of 100 would develop cancer due to consumption of two drinks a day."
- "Higher consumption of alcohol increases breast cancer risk in women".
  - "About four more women out of 100 would develop breast cancer due to consumption of two drinks a day."


This is the new name for Incentive Grants, but it is the same great program. Does your branch have plans for a program, an event, STEM awards, a speaker, and you could use some help with funding?

## **AAUW Proposes an Increase to National Dues**

"The Board of Directors is considering a change to AAUW member dues to help meet rising costs. AAUW member dues have not kept pace with the cost of supporting AAUW's membership and the Board will consider a \$5 per year increase in dues from 2025–29. The dues change supports AAUW's commitment to financial sustainability, the financial strength of the national office and our ability to support branches and states." Current National dues are \$72. All members had an opportunity to respond and to review and comment on the proposed changes to membership dues by January 29. 


## **Leaves from the Branches**

**The Canton AAUW Branch** focused on co-sponsoring a self-defense program for women students at Culver Stockton College. This program hadn't been offered since COVID 19 began. The city's chief of police has the training and teamed up with the chief of campus security for C-SC, so a couple dozen women students had plenty of time to learn from their expertise and experience. A new addition to the program was that the C-SC Fencing Club volunteered to demonstrate what potential victims could experience and should do to protect themselves. We also contributed to the annual Dress for Success event, where community citizens donate slightly used professional clothing for college students to wear to interviews.

The AAUW St. Charles Branch and SCREE (St. Charles Retired Educational Employees) collaborated on a GOTV project to encourage and remind people to vote in the November election. Bonnie Dillard and Barb Prideaux headed this project.

The branch held its annual UN-Auction for AAUW Funds Greatest Needs in November. Members provided a great variety of items to raise funds, then enjoyed a relaxing afternoon of snacks, socializing and sharing.







### The Columbia Branch

The Columbia Branch is getting back to face-to-face meetings, which we are all so happy about. We began in September with an interesting presentation on women in the labor force by a local union representative. Then we moved on to our **2024 Holly Burgess Public Policy Forum** on *The Electoral College: Origins, History and Problems*. More than 48 people attended in person. The forum was held in conjunction with the League of Women Voters of Columbia and Boone County and the Mid-Missouri Civil Liberties Association.

Another well-attended meeting was a history of Missouri Indian tribes. In November we switched back to ZOOM for an introduction to the new Women's Apprenticeship Program at Stephens College, and in January we were VERY happy not to have to go out for our program on Women in the Hall of Famous Missourians and the Capitol. She described the commission's coordinated approach to addressing violence. Statistics show they have achieved remarkable results for a surprisingly modest investment. We highly recommend her presentation.

### The Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch of AAUW

The B-C Boosters, our annual fundraiser for the branch, had a great start with 34 donations since the kick-off at our December Party. Donations are collected through April. These very important contributions help keep our branch going. Proceeds will be allocated first to the Operating Fund and then to scholarships.

January's speaker **Joe Regenbogen** presented *Our Controversial Supreme Court, Past, Present, and Future*. The presentation examined the reasons behind periods of dysfunctionality, and offered thoughts about what would improve its effectiveness within our system of checks and balances.
