Equity Through Education

For several years, AAUW has been working from a strong strategic plan - - strong, but aging. Today, May 13, 2025, the NEWLY updated strategic plan was rolled out! It only took 19 minutes! Our key leaders, Cheryl Sorokin, outgoing AAUW board president, Diane Owens, incoming AAUW board president, and Gloria Blackwell, CEO, gave us the highlights and new focus areas to keep AAUW current with the times and the challenging issues we face.

It is time to narrow our focus a bit and make more meaningful impacts. Three priorities have been set: 1) Funding

Higher Education; 2) Removing Barriers to Success in Education and the Workplace; 3) Strengthening AAUW's Reach. These three areas of emphasis were outlined as follows:

1. Fund Higher Education

- Provide grants and fellowships for women in underserved communities and underrepresented fields like STEM.
- Support women in academia and research.
- Build networks for alumnae to lead and expand AAUW's impact globally.

2. Remove Barriers to Success in Education and the Workplace

- Champion legislation supporting paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, pay equity, and workplace harassment protections.
- Promote inclusive, safe, and accessible educational environments through enforcement of Title IX and other civil rights laws.

3. Strengthen AAUW's Reach

- Support an effective network of states and branches through aligned strategies and initiatives like the Five-Star Program.
- Grow organizational sustainability through member engagement and impact evaluation.

AAUW Missouri's 2024–25 State Conference, May 3, brought together 59 people from across Missouri via Zoom to hear great speakers, to conduct our business meeting, and to announce awards to branches and individuals. **Linda Berube** showed us a few new Zoom tricks, which made the meeting more fun. We introduced the concept of branches holding "Pathway Parties," to gather and experience the Zoom conference as a group. Three 'parties' were held representing 17 members.

National AAUW VP for Advancement, Katrina Sun

Breese, delivered a key message regarding the new strategic plan being rolled out and shared current data and goals for 2025 and beyond. She also noted that with the new administration in Washington, D.C., many of AAUW's core issues are being threatened every day — staff and members are working hard to hold the line.

We then turned our attention to the Missouri educational system and heard Dr. Amber Benge speak of developments on the educational front in the Missouri legislature. Many of the AAUW priority issues are at risk. Dr. Benge is the Co-Executive Director of the Missouri Equity Education Partnership and monitors key educational issues regularly. Both speakers had lively Q&A sessions with our members. Our thanks to both these dynamic presenters!

The state conference always includes a time to celebrate our successes. Missouri branches received recognition for achievement in fulfilling Branch Action Plans via the STAR Awards, presented by **Su Bacon** and **Diane B. Ludwig**, co-program vice presidents. We are proud that we again have 14 of 16 branches receiving STAR Awards (see page 9). Of those, nine are 10-Star branches, one is a 9-Star branch, and three are 6-Star branches! Congratulations to ALL!

Diane Ludwig stood in for Legacy Circle state liaison **Susan Barley** to recognize 25 Missouri Legacy Circle donors and stated that Legacy Circle gift of the late **Ardy Pearson** will now be realized. AAUW Fund chair **Sage Taber** then announced the top five branches in total giving and per-capita giving as well as the 57 Missouri Century Club and 26 Century Club Plus members for 2024. Five branches were recognized for having at least 50 percent of members donating to the AAUW Fund (see page 9). Missouri had a 2024 total giving of \$34,451.13.

The AAUW MO Woman of Distinction Award, presented by **Past-President Karen Francis**, was awarded to two very worthy women (see p. 5). The awards were announced in advance to allow family and friends to be part of the recognition. **Ellen Irons,** of the St. Louis Branch, passed earlier this year and her award was given posthumously. The other honoree, **Pam Kulp**, of the St. Charles Branch and Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch, was on the call to receive her honor. The **Outstanding Member Award** presented by **Membership Vice President Susie Watson**, was given to **Linda Evans** of the Columbia Branch. (see p. 6)

The Opportunities Grants Committee headed by **Carol Cox** reported that the St. Charles Branch received a grant of \$97 to assist in an outreach program which had some great results.

Sue Shineman shared her president's remarks on the great year it has been and how much work we have still to do. She encouraged branches to work with other like-minded organizations on our key issues and reminded everyone to continue to create ADVOCACY and ACTION in Missouri. It was a most successful conference.

Ellen Irons is honored posthumously for her strong commitment to the AAUW mission. In her St. Louis branch, she served as president and program vice president and sponsored 20 projects. Ellen was especially proud of the 250th Celebration of the Founding of St. Louis, which entailed researching 250 Notable Women of St. Louis. She was a leader in the STL IBC and revived the IBC College/University partnership Renewal Task Force.

Ellen chaired the AAUW MO Public Policy Committee, the 19th Centennial Celebration Task Force, and the Missouri Women's History Trail. Her colleagues said: "When she

Pam Kulp brings creativity, energy, talent, and dedication to both the branch and state AAUW. In 2007 Pam attended a AAUW St. Charles Branch meeting and joined on-the-spot! She was an elementary teacher and guidance counselor for 20 years. She chaired Opportunity Grants and is now state STEM chair.

Pam created the "Leadership Skills in Young Girls" Incentive Grant with two local Girl Scout groups in 2010, for 14-year-old girls that featured walking and running activities and culminated with a run in Forest Park with Olympian Jackie Joyner Kersey. The grant encouraged pre-teen girls to participate in service projects. Pam developed the Women in Courage STEM program to showcase FIVE Women in the STEM field. Branch

members portrayed the women and presented the program to 16 middle school math and science 6th grade classrooms.

Pam is the recipient of numerous honors including the St. Charles Branch Named Gift Honoree, Peg Witt Leadership Award, the IBC Barbara Lackritz Service Award, winner of 2024 AAUW Art Contest with her photo "Stunning Water Lilies at the MO Botanical Gardens."

Linda K. Evans is a long-time member of AAUW. When living in St. Louis, she joined the Ballwin-Chesterfield Branch where she quickly became involved in the branch's activities, chairing LAF for the branch and participating in the Trivia fundraiser. After moving to Columbia, she joined the Columbia Branch and there initiated and maintained the Science Student Scholar Awards, a program in STEM for Middle School girls in the Columbia Public School (CPS) system. She works with the science coordinator who requests nominations from the CPS science teachers of fourteen seventh-grade girls, two from each school.

One of our branches recently had an evening reception celebrating 16 outstanding high school senior women in math and science. The event began with a variety of tasty treats, and continued as the young women shared their ambitions, praised teachers who made an impact on their lives, and conversed with like-minded other senior girls throughout the evening. Noteworthy is one senior's thank-you note: "The aspirations and dedication that the AAUW has towards improving equity for us young women has me feeling hopeful and excited for what my future holds. Here's to closing the gender gap in male dominated fields......to making a difference."

Especially clever is **Danica McKellar's** (recall Winnie Cooper from the Wonder Years) approach to teaching math concepts. Check out her website, <u>Mckellarmath.com</u>. Under the heading, *Links* (realizing I make mistakes regularly and might learn something new), I watched the 3-minute #2 episode titled: "How to Stop Making Mistakes." <u>https://youtu.be/PPOLgul4Eq0</u>. These ideas are presented in her book Math Doesn't Suck. (Ages 9-12, and adults.)

for your branch to inspire girls and young women in STEM in grades kindergarten thru high school.


AAUW MO Membership

Kansas City is a city that eliminates discrimination in all forms against Women and Girls in all diversity. We asked the council to pass an Ordinance amending Chapter 38 in the Municipal Code declaring our city as a city that meets the standards to be a City for CEDAW. This Ordinance was sponsored by **Councilwoman Melissa Robinson**. Ordinance 241047 passed unanimously Dec. 12, 2024. The Ordinance requires all departments to annually report actions related to advancing women in positions of decision- making, public safety and training on Gender Based Violence in the
